A Fireside Chat

Over the past year I have had a great deal of time to look back and reflect on a great hobby and the many changes over the past years. I can remember a time when I attended a meeting and it was tough to find a chair. When we actually had more members of the club running for board positions than there were vacancies to fill. These were the "good old days," something that now is just a memory.

Today we have less than 30% of the membership struggling to find enough members to just fill the vacant positions, let alone have an actual election. We had no candidates this year for the board and the people that were asked graciously declined. We are not even in a strong enough position to get someone to run the refreshment committee and let Mark, KG2DE, move on. This committee only works *seven* Mondays a year!

So, let's consider some of the options. We can reduce the size of the board from seven to five. This would allow the club to conduct business and eliminate the manpower shortage. Or we could attempt to get people on the board and leave the problem for the club officers down the road.



From the Archives

With the continuing clean-out of the GLB shop and W2EUP's home, many interesting BARRA artifacts, for lack of a better term, have been turning up. One of the items to surface recently is a log book from the Cherry Creek repeater site, dating from April 27, 1974 to April 11, 1976. The log contains not only technical information about work performed at or equipment built for the site but also various anecdotes about dealing with the rugged conditions at the site. All of the entries appear to have been made by Gil, W2EUP. Here is an entry from 1975:

"2-15-75 EUP, K2OXH. Walked up -- walking was tough -- about a foot of new snow. Took along 2 gallons of kerosine. [sic] Minigen gone. [small wind generator] Jerry went up tower to check. Screws removed, wires pulled out, cover torn loose on one side. Evidence indicates fall-off rather than removal. Started digging in snow -- found it about 4 feet from tower buried as deeply as possible in snow. No surface evidence.

Thawed it out and brought down frame. Prop & gen OK, check out electrically! Reassembled using jam nuts at rear of studs, split lockwashers at front. [...] Big wind gen broke a weld. Gen hanging loose, cover back, electronics package destroyed.

Left about 4:30."



The Phoenix area, with its desert climate, is a popular destination for hams from Western New York. The high level of Amateur Radio activity there makes it worthwhile to stow a rig in your bag for the trip.

Metro Phoenix sits in the "Valley of the Sun" and the terrain is fairly flat and ringed by mountains and hills. One can easily spot a ham antenna or tower every mile or so. Buttes also stick up from the valley floor, some with antennas on them. Barry Goldwater's legendary MARS station was on the south side of the "Camelback" with a commanding view of the valley.

Firms such as Motorola and the DeVry Institute have their own radio clubs, which sponsor repeaters and hamfests. Downtown, there is a beautiful science museum with a fully equipped amateur station, which visiting hams are welcome to operate.

The FM Repeater Atlas lists approximately five repeaters on 6 meters, 34 on 2 meters, 3 and 1¹/₄ meters, 77 on 70 cm, and two for

During a recent visit to my brother in Scottsdale, I decided to make a "cold call" on a local ham down the street. The antenna farm on his home and vehicle appeared to cover DC to light (photo 1). This sort of ham is usually quite friendly. I was not disappointed. He turned out to be W7IXA, Doug May, a retired Motorola engineer who works from home as an RF consultant. He operates all bands and modes, but is particularly interested in remote bands and linking.

The system with Doug's arm draped around the cabinet (photo 2) is a remote base linked to two different mountain top sites using the 70-cm band. The 70-cm radio can be remotely controlled from the repeater input as well as from either link. It also features a programmable 2-meter Motorola radio. The antenna for the remote is at the top of a 65-foot tower and the link antennas are vertical yagis on a roof pole.

The photo of the three cabinets on the patio shows a similar system (photo 3), which will be installed on 7800-foot Mingus Mountain in Central Arizona when the weather permits. The right cabinet contains a 6-meter remote base with four selectable channels and the center cabinet is a programmable 2-meter remote base. Both of these radios are Saguaro Amateur Remote Base Association, which is an affiliate of the Cactus Intertie System.

The Cactus Intertie System is an Amateur Radio closed private system consisting of a large number of remote base stations and 70 cm repeaters interconnected with full-duplex links.
