Cole Road Back Online After Lightning Damage

Following the severe lightning hit in late June, the Cole Road repeater site has been back online for some weeks now thanks to the dedicated efforts of the Technical Committee. Within days of the hit in the last week of June, the 146.91 repeater was back on the air with low



power, and the 224.82 repeater was back on by mid-July. Throughout the rest of July, other damaged systems were repaired and returned to operation. By the beginning of August, practically every aspect of the Cole Rd system was again functioning.

To prevent damage of this magnitude from happening in the future, members of the Technical Committee have been spending the summer revamping the cable infrastructure of the site. Now every wire going to the equipment in the shack, whether RF, power (AC or DC), telephone, etc., passes through a plate, which is connected by 000 wire to ground. On that plate are additional surge protectors for the AC supply and telephone. The equipment rack has been effectively placed above ground, so that lightning entering the shack by whatever path will be guided to ground by the grounded plate, rather than through equipment or other circuitry.

In making these changes, the equipment racks in the shack have been moved out from the wall about two feet to facilitate this new wiring plan. An additional benefit is that it makes it much easier to work on the rigs as both sides of the racks are now easily accessible.

Mobile Clinic Well Attended

The Annual Mobile Clinic held July 18 at the Cole Road repeater site was another successful outing for the members of BARRA. Damage from the recent lightning hit and the repairs then underway could be seen, and the grounds to the towers were replaced during the picnic.

A record turnout (38) for the Mobile Clinic included some of the hams who participated in the ATV balloon launch at the Batavia Hamfest and they told of their adventures with that event. Also in attendance was a woodchuck who is suspected of being the culprit that swiped KB1XW's hot dog.

A pleasant summer evening helped to provide the perfect setting for BARRA's annual picnic. Many thanks to all who turned out and to the members who helped with the preparations.

Editor's PTT

Welcome back! I normally don't like to harp on a topic more than once in these columns, but a few things came to my attention over the summer that have some bearing on my comments in the July issue. In that issue of *The Link*, I talked about the purported reliability of the cellular telephone network and the possible ramifications that those assumptions could have on amateur radio.

Shortly after the July issue came out, I was at the family cottage in northern Ontario on Georgian Bay. The cottage is out in the islands and has no landline telephone service. On the night of July 14/15 a major storm swept across the Great Lakes causing a lot of damage in its wake. According to media reports the next morning, electrical service locally was knocked out from Barrie to Britt -- a distance of well over 100 miles -- as well as the expected interruptions in telephone service and other utilities. Knowing the folks at home listen to Canadian radio and would hear the media reports of the extensive damage in our vicinity, I fired up the cell phone to call home and report that all was well with us. Surprise! The local cell site was a victim of the storm. I could get access through a more distant site, but each call attempt was greeted with a recording to call a Toronto number on a landline phone "for further assistance." Maybe the landline interruptions were to blame, or maybe it was because this distant cell site was operated by a different company. After waiting an hour or so, the local site was back online -- this was about 12 noon -- and I could place the call home. Fortunately this was not a life-ordeath situation requiring immediate assistance, but merely an inconvenience. I shudder to think what someone else would have done in the same situation, but needed help fast. A ham could have fired up the HF rig or 2 meter HT, but as we know, not everyone is a ham.

Just this week, I was reading the September issue of *Worldradio* magazine and came across the following related item in their editor's column:

We'd like to add the (not exactly AR related, but applicable) next bit of information to the discussion of the Internet or cellular phones taking over the Amateur Radio role in emergencies. To spare the organization the utter ridicule that would come their way (deservingly, though), the city name has been deleted: "The XXXX Emergency Planning Office said 'rather than having to rely on telephones, for instance, where lines are at risk in bad weather, we are encouraging the wider use of fax machines."

There's a lot of techno-boobs out there at every turn, gang, and the most dangerous (to ham radio) are those in positions of power (political or otherwise) in our communities. Keep your eyes and ears open, and most importantly, keep up Amateur Radio!

Our Machines that go "KerChunk" in the Night

145.17 - The squelch tail on the transmitter was lengthened to allow the cooling fan to operate longer. This machine has tubes in the finals which need to be cooled properly.

146.73 - The repeater appears to be working very well after the remedial receiver work at the beginning of the summer.

146.91 - See the article on page one about the follow-up work on the lightning damage at this site. One correction to the lightning damage report in the July issue is that the two meter power amp damaged in that incident is a



Micor unit, not a General Electric. KB1XW is looking into getting that amplifier repaired.

147.00 - KB1XW is still looking for people with chain saws to put together a work party at this site to do some clearing around the wind generator. Over the years, the trees nearest the tower have grown large enough to block the proper wind flow around the wind generator. If you have a chain saw and are interested in participating in a work party, contact KB1XW at 282-7159. When enough people are interested, a date can be scheduled.

224.82 - A bad case of desense has cropped up with this repeater, preventing all but very strong stations from getting into the machine. It is believed that the new final transistor installed after the



lightning hit has deteriorated, creating excessive noise in the receiver. Further evaluation is needed.



442.00 - The repeater transmitter was off frequency a bit and was tweaked back by WB2HYP in late August. While at the site for the adjustment, experiments with two meter coverage from inside the site were conducted by N2YDM and WB2HYP with an eye towards two meter remote base possibilities. Very satisfactory results were had with just an HT and a rubber duck antenna.

444.00 - Most of the bugs and growing pains in the receiver voting system for this repeater have been worked out. There are a total of three receivers for this repeater, two at the UB Main Street site (on different buildings), and one at the Cole Road site in Boston. The main repeater transmitter outputs a different PL tone based on which receiver is voted, and changes in real time. This has been an exciting addition to the repeater and has really furthered the "blanket" coverage of the 444 machine in the WNY area.

Repeater Field Report Forms In This Issue

Gil Boelke, W2EUP, chairman of the BARRA Technical Committee has proposed an effort which will require the assistance of all BARRA members. To determine the actual coverage areas of the club's repeaters for further improvements like remote receivers and transmitters, an accurate "profile" of each machine is needed. While a few members of the Tech Committee could burn up a lot of gas driving around the greater WNY area to find this out, what better way to involve the membership than to find out how the repeaters come through -- in the areas where the members use them!

A page of four standard forms is included in this issue between pages 4 and 5, and one is filled out as an example. The forms are relatively simple to fill out, and each member is encouraged to submit at least one report. If you do not have the capability for a particular band, that's fine! Report on whatever band(s) you use.



At the top of the form are blanks for your call, rig, power, and antenna used. The large box to the right is for any additional comments you wish to make about your report.

Each line below that is for each of the BARRA repeaters. Please indicate your

location at the time you made the report for that repeater, and indicate in one of the boxes to the right the received signal from the repeater with an "R" and if you talked to someone through the repeater from that location, indicate your signal report in the appropriate box with a "T."

Once we get a number of reports in from each repeater, a profile map can be assembled for each machine and a better view of the coverage of each machine can be attained. Feel free to submit as many or as few reports on each machine from whatever locations you happen to travel. The more the merrier! Send your completed forms to the club's PO box. This will be an ongoing project over the next few months.

There will be more forms available at the general meetings. If you cannot make it to a meeting and need more forms, call the editor.

Is Your FCC Info Up to Date?

Have you moved since your amateur license was issued? Did you file a Form 610 with the FCC when you moved to change your address? Your editor was perusing a ham callbook CD-ROM recently and discovered a number of BARRA members whose address on the CD-ROM (and hence with the FCC) is different than the address on the club roster, which is assumably your current address.



The importance of keeping your information up to date with the FCC cannot be emphasized enough. If for nothing else, an incorrect address on file with the FCC will result in your QSL cards going to the wrong address!

Take a moment to check your ham license NOW and make sure the address is accurate. If not, file a Form 610 with the FCC right away to change your address!
